Harvest

It is one of the oldest and most traditional of British festivals taking place at the time of the Harvest Moon but, other than gathering up tinned goods and taking them to church, what is Harvest Festival all about?

The Harvest celebrations pre-date Christianity but it has always been seen as a very spiritual time to give thanks for the year's crop. Symbolic corn dolls made out of the last sheath were placed on banquet tables when parishes had their huge feasts. The doll was then kept until the spring to ensure the continuation of a good crop the following year.

Harvest normally makes us think of agriculture but many harvest celebrations exist around the country that

celebrate another type of reaping. There are about 24 festivals that give thanks for the seasons. In October in Billingsgate there's the Harvest of the Sea Thanksgiving where fish and netting decorate the church. These festivals arose in many fishing towns and villages where the locals depend largely on fishing for a living. A tradition in North Shields during the Blessing of the Salmon Fishery is to give the first salmon catch to the vicar!

Sundridge and Brasted Primary School

It is hard to believe that another year has passed at Sundridge and Brasted School and that I am writing this during the summer holidays.

It has been a very successful year, both academically and pastorally, with our Key Stage 1 and 2 SATS results improving on last year. The last term of the academic year was, as usual, full of events and activities that enhance the children's learning and development.

On the sporting front, a group of Year 2s attended the Heptathlon event organised by the Sevenoaks Sports Partnership. They tried speed bounce, long jump, chest presses, dishes and domes, an obstacle race, hurdles, target throwing and a sprint. It was extremely hot but the children were all superb. Their behaviour was, once again, exemplary and a credit to the school. On another hot day we held our annual Sports Day at the recreation ground with all the children taking part and representing their houses. There was a carousel of field activities to start, with lots of fun had, followed by track events and year sprints. Once again the children helped each other and supported their houses with vigour. What was also lovely to see was the efficient way that the Year 6 House Captains and Sports Captains ran the day. This year the Year 6s have been given more responsibility and events like this highlighted the skills they have learnt throughout the year which will greatly assist them in secondary school. During the last term we also had the opportunity for Years 5 and 6 to attend the Hever Triathlon. At this event they were introduced to the three disciplines: swimming, running and cycling. However they were also shown how the transitions between these events are equally important and a particular skill. I was so pleased to see them all enter the lake for the swimming part, which is no mean achievement. Once again their behaviour and attitude was commented on favourably by the event organisers. I have highlighted our sporting achievements all this year as this is an extremely

important part of the all-round education we provide at the school and I was therefore very proud when we received confirmation of having achieved the Gold School Game Mark for a school devoid of proper sporting facilities!

We had two further trips in our last term with Elm Class (Years 5 and 6) visiting the Dibgate studios in Sundridge to learn about the art techniques employed by the local artists exhibiting there.



As a reward for their excellent work this year, our Reception class took a trip to the seaside and was treated to all sorts of beach activities culminating in ice creams at the end of a successful day. Our Years 3 to 6 performed a country dance at the Sundridge Fete despite having little practice this year. We also had a great turnout at the Sevenoaks Festival on the first Saturday with the children singing two songs from our Summer Production: Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. This year's Summer Production was excellent! Charlie and the Chocolate Factory has never looked better! This was a challenging production but the children's hard work really paid off to produce an entertaining show



staged at Knole Academy to a full house. The previous week Maple Class (Reception children) successfully sang and danced a routine from the production at the Step Together Festival for Reception Classes in Sevenoaks. They were real stars and enjoyed an early foray into the dramatic arts.

As I mentioned - a busy term! We even managed to fit in fantastic and talented piano performances from the children learning this instrument this year, alongside a visit from boys at Solefields School who spent the day reading with the children and discussing literature.

Our last event was the Leavers Service at St Mary's which, as usual, was an emotional event. I wish the Year 6s all the best in their journey through secondary school and also would like to take this opportunity to thank all my staff who have been outstanding this year and all the members of the community who have assisted in various ways throughout the year. We pride ourselves in being a community-based school and value assistance from all local people. I look forward to another eventful and successful year at Sundridge and Brasted.

Sundridge and Westerham Bellringers

The Sundridge and Westerham bellringers recently enjoyed a visit to St George's Church, Ypres to ring the newly installed set of change-ringing bells.

St George's Church was built in 1927 at the request of regiments as a memorial dedicated to their fallen comrades. The bell tower was built by Sir James Knott in memory of his two sons who fell in the Great War.

The kneelers, windows, banners and plaques all show regimental badges and emblems.

We attended the evening ceremony at the Menin Gate and also visited the Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery at Passchendaele.



1,400 bellringers died in the Great War and it was thought that a fitting memorial to them would be to install a ring of bells for the 100 year anniversary. This was completed during
