The new Bishop of Rochester



The new Bishop of Rochester, the Rt Rev Dr Jonathan Gibbs, was officially welcomed and his ministry inaugurated at a special service of welcome at Rochester Cathedral on Saturday 24 September. The service-streamed live on YouTube-was attended by civic dignitaries, as well as representatives from across the Diocese, and included several important and symbolic moments.

The service began with Bishop Jonathan knocking on the closed doors of the Cathedral and waiting to be welcomed in. On the other side, he was met by young people from Bennett Memorial School, who questioned him about who he was and the purpose of his ministry. The Archbishop's Mandate - a formal commission - was presented and read aloud by the Chancellor – the legal judge for the Diocese – the Worshipful John Gallagher. Bishop Jonathan then made oaths of allegiance and faithfulness to the Church and the Diocese as he placed his hand on the Coverdale Bible, one of the treasures of the Cathedral's Library. Representatives of the Diocese then welcomed and prayed for the different aspects of Bishop Jonathan's ministry through the presentation of a series of gifts. These included a cup and saucer to represent his ministry of hospitality and a fruit tree to represent the imperative to respond to the climate crisis.

Bishop Jonathan was then placed in the bishop's seat – the cathedra – by the Archdeacon of Canterbury who was representing the Archbishop of Canterbury. After being anointed with oil to represent the blessing of the Holy Spirit, Bishop Jonathan then took up the Diocesan Crozier – a ceremonial staff – as the symbol of his authority and care in the Diocese.

Giving the sermon, Bishop Jonathan reflected on the 'unprecedented times' we live in and how it is understandable to feel daunted by the challenges we face. He said, however, that we should be reassured that God will use whatever resources we have and make it enough. He continued "The Church of Jesus Christ does not exist for its own sake, but for the sake of the kingdom of God – that is, for the sake of seeing God's reign of righteousness and peace prevail in our world. Now that can seem a daunting task when we feel that we have few resources – maybe in a small rural church or in a deprived urban parish, or wherever we find ourselves - and certainly the disciples may well have felt daunted when Jesus said to them as they looked at the huge crowd, "You give them something to eat!" But, as on that day, Jesus takes what we have, blesses it and then asks us to share it out, to give of ourselves and our resources, generously and liberally, trusting that he will use what we give to feed the hungry and refresh the thirsty. This is the Calling of the Church in this Diocese, in all our parishes and communities: to put what we have in the hands of Jesus and to ask him to bless and multiply what we have given, so that the hungry may be fed in both body and soul and discover more of the love of God for themselves. Precisely what that looks like and how we go about it will of course differ from place to place in this wonderfully diverse Diocese of ours, but whatever our situation, I believe we need to keep in mind the three priorities I outlined back in March and have re-stated in the order of service today: Grow - Change - Serve"

A25 accidents

Members of the Parish Council have discussed their concern about the number of traffic accidents in Sundridge and it was agreed that the Council would contact County Cllr Nick Chard to see what improvements could be made and to request permanent speed cameras on the A25.

Sundridge Recreation Ground

A new recycling bin will be placed on the recreation ground by the car park to stop the rubbish being strewn over the access path. The Council will also be taking actions to tidy up the pavilion.

Planning Permission process

Councillors thought it would be helpful to residents to explain how the planning process works.

The Planning Committee is a committee of the Parish Council and is comprised of Members from both Ide Hill and Sundridge to ensure an even balance of views and local knowledge. We consider the details of all relevant planning, conservation and tree preservation orders bearing in mind the effect that they might have on our village and/or environment.

All Planning Applications relating to properties in our Parish are referred to us for our comments by either Sevenoaks District Council (in most cases) or Kent County Council.

A large part of our Parish is in a conservation area and/or Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and therefore great care has to be taken in consideration of each application and specific planning policies in these respects.

Whilst the Parish Council can make representations to the Planning Authority, our comments are not legally binding on it, but the authority must take them into consideration when making any decision.

In these ways your Councillors will continue to monitor and comment on all proposals in order to do what we can to protect the beautiful environment in which we live.


Parish Council Meetings

Greetings from Sundridge & Brasted CE Primary School! Forest School continues to be AMAZING! Our Forest School lead, Natalia, is so creative and inspiring. The children are having so much fun and learning through play and exploration. Each week is themed and so far the children have learnt about hedgehogs and made their own clay hedgehogs. They have learnt about conkers, made their own conker necklaces and painted pieces of cloth with the paints they made from turmeric, paprika, raspberries and beetroot! For the last session of the term the children learnt how to make a fire and cooked spiced apples and hot chocolate. Wonderful learning experiences!



We've been apple picking, too, and thank Mr and Mrs Jack who kindly invited the children to pick the apples from the many, plentiful trees in their garden. Great fun was had by all and lots of apples were taken home.

We are also delighted that Reverend Tim has found time in his busy schedule to lead our weekly Collective Worship services at St Mary's Church. He also led our Harvest Service earlier in the month when each of our classes presented a story, a song or a prayer. Parents joined us too and it was a lovely service. As a school we collected donations to pass on to the Loaves and Fishes foodbank which is run by St John's Church in Sevenoaks and supports more than 40 families within the community.

In sporting events we have taken part in a football tournament at St Michael's Prep School, an Aqua Splash event at Sevenoaks School, a Triathlon and Netball training. And it's only October!

We have appointed our head boy and head girl for the year together with sports captains, kindness monitors and worship monitors. They will all be wonderful leaders and we look forward to seeing them develop their skills as the year progresses.
