
# The Sundridge Village News December 2023 - January 2024

## A Crafty Afternoon in the Church

Saturday 25th November saw a group of villagers put their creative skills to the test to make Christmas wreaths. Now that some pews at the back of the church have been removed, it made an ideal place to assemble some beautiful wreaths while listening to Christmas music and partaking of one or two sneaky mince pies and mulled wines. The results were spectacular.



### Brasted, Ide Hill and Sundridge Gardening Society

Our 2023 AGM was conducted in record time, with the Committee all happy to stand again and then being duly elected. While our speaker was preparing for her talk, everyone took the opportunity to refill their glasses, have a chat and sample some of the nibbles!

Our speaker was Jacqueline Anthony, Assistant County Organiser for Kent National Garden Scheme, and she gave us a fascinating insight as to how the scheme was formed. In 1859 William Rathbone employed Mary Robinson to nurse his sick wife and retained her after his wife's death, so that people in Liverpool who could not afford to pay for nursing could benefit from being nursed at home.

He worked closely with Florence Nightingale and in 1887 the Queen's Nursing Institute was formed. It was in 1926 at a Queen's Nursing Institute meeting that Elsie Wagg came up with the idea of opening peoples' gardens to the public and the money raised going to medical causes. As they say, 'the rest is history' and the scheme still does this wonderful work today, donating vast sums of money to societies such as Macmillan Nurses, The British Heart Foundation and Cancer Research, to name but a few.

Jacqueline also showed us some beautiful pictures, inspiring us to go and visit some of the gardens in the scheme next year. This was our last meeting of 2023. We meet again on Wednesday 14th February 2024 for our Afternoon Tea so, if you are tempted to join us, please come along and meet us and have a cup of tea and a cake, we would love to see you.

On another note, we were all very saddened to hear that one of our long-standing members, Sheila Turner, had passed away. Many of us knew Sheila and her late husband, Alan, who both joined the Sundridge and Brasted Horticultural Society in the 1980s. Alan was Treasurer, Chairman and a Vice President over the years until 2006 and in the early years Sheila was actively involved providing teas at events such as the Society shows. She became a Committee Member in the mid-1990s and was Secretary for three years from 2001 to 2004 when she became Programme Secretary, a post she held till 2009 when she retired from the Committee. We are grateful for Sheila's loyalty and service to the Society and for the friendships that were made during her time with us. She will be fondly remembered and missed by all that knew and loved her, and our heartfelt condolences go to all of Sheila's family and friends. A Memorial Service will be held on Wednesday 13th December at 2.30pm at Sundridge Church in celebration of Sheila's life.

## Sundridge with Ide Hill Parish Council update

#### Kent Highways meeting

On 24th October representatives of the Parish Council met with representatives of Kent County Council Highways. It was a great opportunity to sit down and discuss in person some of the challenges being faced by the parish. Below is an account of what was discussed, which the Parish Council is keen to share to ensure residents are kept up to date. The details of the meeting will also now be taken back to the full Parish Council for consideration and so no actions have yet been agreed or taken. The Parish Council will keep residents informed as discussions progress and actions are agreed.

#### Sundridge Ward

1. Safe crossing at the crossroads between the A25, Chevening Road and Church Road. As residents will be aware, we have had numerous accidents in this area and residents struggle with feeling safe enough to cross the road here. The question was raised to Highways about possible options. Highways confirmed that it was unlikely that a pedestrian crossing could be added here. The cost would likely be upwards of £75,000. The delay that would be caused to the A25 due to stopping all traffic on both roads frequently to allow pedestrians to cross would also be untenable and severely impact traffic flow in the area, something that is already a major challenge. We discussed any options to introduce a pedestrian crossing further down the A25 but nearer to the crossroads. Highways confirmed that the current location of the pedestrian crossing, on the A25 past the shop, is the first safe location along the A25 due to the requirement for clear line of sight and so introducing one closer was not possible. Their recommendation is that pedestrians continue to use the existing crossing to cross the A25 as this is the only confirmed safe location.

2. Following the parking survey (which received a good response and consistent information so thank you to all residents that responded), we raised the issues highlighted from the survey: parking on the A25 and surrounding roads and blocking of the pavement due to parked cars. Highways confirmed their remit is to ensure safe free flow of the highway and pedestrian safe access to the pavements. We raised several suggestions that could possibly help the village with parking:

a. Allowing residents permission to create their own off-road parking on their front gardens. Highways confirmed any resident wanting to explore this option should apply online at the following link: Apply for a dropped kerb, extension or access point - Kent County Council. There is a fee which must be paid even if the request is denied, so they recommend reading all the criteria that must be met (details on their website) before applying. The criteria are set by the Department of Transport and adopted by Kent Highways. They did confirm that they will never approve access in any situation that would result in a more dangerous outcome for the highway and its users.

b. Moving the white line over to give wider access on the south side of the main road to support parking that is there today. This was rejected due to the width of the road.

c. Reducing the width or location of the pavement to introduce parking bays on the A25 near The White Horse where the pavement is wider or on Chevening Road where there is also the grass bank. Highways confirmed there are no plans to take anything of this nature forward. The cost is prohibitive.

d. Replacing the green on Chapmans Road with parking bays. This land is not owned by Kent Highways and so this is something the Parish Council could explore further with Sevenoaks District Council (who own the land) after further consultation with the residents of Chapmans Road.

e. Introducing a public carpark. Providing parking is not within Kent Highways' remit and so any steps to do this would be in the hands of the parish and at our village's expense.

Highways confirmed the only action that they would consider taking would be to double-yellow line the A25 as this would remove the issues with pedestrians not being able to safely use the pavement which was a clear concern raised by residents in the recent survey. This, though, would exacerbate the current lack of parking in the village. There is also a concern this would facilitate the traffic moving faster along the A25 when speeding is already a concern.

3. We discussed the issues with speeding on both the A25 and other roads in the village. Highways confirmed that the average speed cameras on the A25 were always for a trial period only. However, Nick Chard, our Kent County Councillor, our three Sevenoaks District Councillors and the Parish Council are continuing to campaign for their return. Highways confirmed this was a possibility; however, it would always be on a rolling basis so the equipment (which is very expensive to run) could be used in multiple Kent locations throughout the year. This is an ongoing discussion, and we will keep the village updated on any developments as they happen.

Highways highlighted a possible option to try and reduce speeding by introducing village entry gates (see example in image below) on the A25 to the east as you



enter the village. The theory is that this acts as a speed deterrent as they set drivers' perception that they are entering a residential village and naturally slow down. The cost of these would need to come from the Parish Council; however, this cost would be more achievable than any of the other points discussed.

Speeding on the side roads was also discussed, particularly in relation to the traffic leaving Ide Hill and coming down Church Road to the traffic lights. Highways have agreed to run speed checks to collect data that can then help inform any further action that could be taken on these roads.

They also confirmed that they have found the most effective means of reducing speed in these types of roads is by villages running a local speed campaign. Highways are sending the Parish Council a speed campaign pack which contains posters and stickers residents can place on their property to remind drivers of the speed and encourage drivers to stick to it.

#### Ide Hill Ward

1. In Ide Hill we discussed whether the 30mph speed limit from the Pre-school through to beyond the Primary School could be reduced to 20mph. Highways agreed to put in place a data survey to see whether there were currently any issues with speeding especially near the school and we await the results. In the meantime, other options to make motorists more speed aware were discussed and are to be considered once we have the data. In the interim, Kent Highways will be providing the Parish Council with a speed awareness pack of posters and stickers to be used by the Parish Council and residents to remind drivers of the current limit and to stick to it. When this is received, we will make residents aware.

2. Highways confirmed that they would agree to kerbing being installed around the Green but would not fund it. The Parish Council does not have the funds to do this but will engage with local residents to see what can be achieved.

#### Next Steps

The full Parish Council will now review all this information over the coming months to determine the best next steps.

#### Ide Hill Christmas tree

Once again, the Parish Council will be providing a Christmas Tree for Ide Hill which should have been erected by the time you read this newsletter. The Parish Council has also provided a new socket on the streetlight next to the roundabout so we can now use mains powered lights, saving a significant number of batteries this year and into the future.

#### Carols on the Green

The annual Ide Hill Christmas Carols on the Green will take place on Friday 8th December, starting at the earlier time of 6pm so more families can attend. The Parish Council will provide mulled wine, hot chocolate, mince pies and sweets for all. So, brave the cold and come to join us in singing a few Christmas favourites.

#### Stubbs Wood

Aztech Tree Services have completed the first phase of work at Stubbs Wood which was the widening of the bridleway from the car park in both directions. This has involved the removal of several trees in accordance with the Woodland Management Plan. A grant which funds support of the woodland is based upon this plan. Conformance with this plan is necessary to improve the woodland amenity, encourage more wildlife and increase natural regeneration. The widening of this bridleway will increase the amount of light getting into the wood and, once it dries out, will give better access for riders and walkers. Unfortunately, the work has coincided with a very wet start to the winter so the felled timber will have to remain until ground conditions improve. The rutting caused by the machinery has been reduced somewhat by the contractor but, given the natural drainage issues of parts of the bridleway, we are looking for ways to improve drainage later in the winter. The volunteers will be asked to see if they can assist in this.

The next stage of work, coppicing and thinning of the woods, will take place in the new year, probably February.

The forbearance of the public is greatly appreciated whilst this work is going on through the winter and all users of the woods are reminded to take extra care at this time and especially when works are taking place. Notices of closures and diversions are for the safety of everyone and are not merely an inconvenience but must be heeded. Memorial benches at Stubbs Wood

As the work progresses in Stubbs Wood, new vistas will be opened up. The Parish Council would be happy to receive any applications for memorial benches to be procured and placed in the woods. The Parish Council has a bench policy and potential donors should contact the Clerk for details and prices. Please note that the location of any benches is subject to approval by the Ide Hill Amenities Committee of the Parish Council.

#### Ide Hill Phone Box

Local residents Peter Wade and Derry Wiltshire have voluntarily taken on the task of sprucing up the old Telephone Box next to the bus stop on the Green. The Parish Council have supplied the materials and work is currently underway, but the early results look impressive. **Goathurst Common Playground** 

On Saturday 11th November, the Quiz Night to raise funds for a new playground at Goathurst Common recreation ground was attended by 80+ people and raised over £1,500.

The event also raised awareness among residents who have made offers of assistance plus a couple of donations of items and equipment not being used elsewhere. Residents have offered manual help to reduce costs and the playground fundraising team are looking at possibly refurbishing some of the existing items rather than replacing them.

In the meantime, applications for grants and donations are being actively followed up.
